Thomas H. Chubb and

the Henshall-VanAntwerp Reel

There are few vintage casting reels that garner the immediate attention of both advanced and novice collectors as the "Henshall-VanAntwerp" reels.

"Wow, that's a really cool looking reel" is often the reaction when one is shown this reel for the first time. The obvious high quality of the reel with its uncommon thumb break lever and rim mounted click mechanisms make it stand out from the crowd of vintage casting reels. Thomas Chubb's 1887 patent for this reel was a culmination of about 17 years of successful rod and tackle manufacturing.

A little history of this great inventor is appropriate. Thomas Henry Chubb was born on Nov. 4, 1836, in Charleston, Massachusetts. In 1849 his parents and family moved to Galveston, Texas. There, he married Isabel Mason on Sept. 1, 1859. After managing the family's plantation, he worked his way up through the ranks of the Confederate Navy and captained three different ships as a Union blockade runner. He was eventually captured by Union forces and forced to pay a large sum for his release. Chubb returned to Galveston after the war and worked in the shipyard.

In 1868, Chubb moved his family to Post Mills, Vermont, a small village outside of Thetford. There he joined in a partnership with William Marston and bought a mill factory to make shovel and rake handles. Chubb was inspired to make a better fishing rod after seeing the often poor quality of rods that were available at

the time. He bought out Marston and went into the rod building business. His company "Thos. H. Chubb" was then established in 1869.

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

T.H. Chubb received 10 fishing related patents and one design specification in his lifetime. The year 1880 was when we first see evidence of





Chubb's innovative capabilities. In that year he received 4 patents. Three were for reel seat designs for rods and the fourth was for a sinker or float line attachment. In the following three years he received 4 more patents related to rod design. Chubb didn't start advertising in the sporting publications until the early 1880s. These advertisements were targeting amateur rod builders that he intended to supply building materials. He also provided component parts like spools, plates and handles made out of brass or German silver to reel manufacturers.

In 1883, Chubb received his first patent for a reel. This patent was for a single-action fly reel which included a folding foot, a click and a spool end play spring design. His 1883 Design Specification clarified the patent to include the convex end plates we see on his fly reels.

By 1885, a mutually beneficial friendship between Thos. Chubb and Dr. James A. Henshall had developed. Chubb was advertising the "Six Strip Split Bamboo Henshall Rod" and the "Henshall-VanAntwerp"

reel. Meanwhile, Henshall was extolling in his publications the benefits of the rod and reel named after him. The first advertisement for the Henshall-Van-Antwerp reel is seen in 1885.

The design of the Henshall-VanAntwerp reel included a thumb brake drag and a click. The drag could also be adjusted by rotating the knob on the front plate below the thumb break. The click was engaged by rotating the knob at the top of the front plate. The reel also came with adjustable pivots for spool end play.

The serial numbers for the first model Henshall-Van Antwerp reels range from 98 to 183 based on personal records and Lang's Auction catalogs. More feedback is required to better quantify the serial number range for this model. Another aspect of the serial number range is the type of gears in the reels. Based on personal observations, the gear teeth design was changed



The spiral helical gear in the Henshall-VanAntwerp Reel serial number 183




from straight spur to spiral helical designs somewhere between serial numbers 98 and 183. This changeover may have been the result of Chubb's learning that B.F. Meek had introduced spiral helical gearing to reels in 1883.

The Henshall-VanAntwerp reel design concepts were attributed to Dr. James A. Henshall and to Dr. William Van Antwerp of Mt. Sterling, Kentucky. The implementation of these design concepts into an actual real design was made by Chubb himself. His name alone appears as the inventor on the September 27, 1887 patent of the reel. The patent drawing actually shows the second model of the reel with a rim mounted click lever

In 1888, the design of the Henshall-VanAntwerp click design was changed to look more like that in the 1887 patent. This model was called the "Improved" reel. The thumb brake was also moved to the rear end plate and the click was now engaged by moving the lever located on top of the front or rear end plates. These reels are referred to as the second model. Variations in this model with click lever location have been seen. This model is shown in the Chubb catalogs and magazine advertisements from 1888 to 1891.

Serial numbers for the second model with thumb brake on the left side and click lever on the right side range from 217 to 278 based on personal records and from Lang's Auction catalogs. Serial

numbers with the click lever moved to the left end plate, range from 322 to 442. Once again, more information is needed to better define these ranges.

In February 1891, a fire destroyed the Thos. Chubb factory. The \$20,000 insurance policy would not cover his estimated \$65,000 in damages, but Chubb tried

THE CHUBB FACTORY FIRE.—Thousands of anglers will sympathize with Mr. Thos. H. Chubb, of Post Mills, Vr.' in the serious calamity which has come upon him in the destruction of his factory by fire on the 28d uit. The loss is put at \$65,000, with an insurance of \$20,000. Mr. Chubb is a man of grit and stout heart, as the immense business built up by him testifies. In a letter just received from him he tells us that he has set up in an empty mill what little machinery was saved from the wreck, and hopes soon to get into shape again. He is filling retail orders, and while the stock holds out he naturally hopes that his friends may not be deterred by the reports of the fire from sending their orders. We have received and will notice next week the Chubb catalogue for 1891.

to maintain the business the best he could.

Shortly after the fire, Chubb decided rather than rebuild, he would sell the company. He had developed a great reputation as a rod and tackle manufacturer and had no trouble finding a buyer. Montague City Rod Company bought Chubb's company and changed the name from "Thos. H. Chubb" to "T.H. Chubb Rod Co."

The Henshall-VanAntwerp reel design was to change once again after Montague bought Chubb's company. The reel now no longer has a thumb

brake or a rim mounted click lever. The reel now resembles the more common design of the times with two sliding buttons for the click and drag. The 1893 T.H. Chubb Rod Co. Catalog shows the new design.

The fourth and final model of the Henshall-VanAntwerp reel was made for Montague by Julius vom FISHING RODS.

Hofe. It varies from the third model in that it has the commonly seen Julius vom Hofe reel design features. The reel has just a sliding click and no drag, a spring washer under the rear plate end cap for the adjustable pivots, and the characteristic hole in the center of the reel
